Functional Areas Audience Joining Us

- 33% are coming from academic affairs
- 16% are coming from student affairs
- 16% are coming from another area of higher education not listed on the registration form
- 11% have blended or multiple functional areas
- 5% are coming from business/finance
- 5% are coming from outside of higher education
- 4% are coming from advancement
- 1% are coming from legal affairs

Level of Audience Members

- 32% are senior level
- 29% are mid-level
- 28% are cabinet level
- 6% are entry level
- 5% are presidents

American College President Study (2022) & The Changing College President (2024) Analysis

- Conducted about every five years since 1986
- Collects demographic and experience data
- Data collected in Feb June 2022
- Over 1,000 presidents responded
 - 880 presidents listed their previous 5 positions
- Did an analysis of the 880
 - Those who were provosts and those who were not
 - Just over half (458 respondents) did not hold provost positions

Why this report and webinar?

- Illustrate the changing nature of the pathway to the college presidency
- Help those who are conducting searches to expand their notion of the "ideal candidate" beyond the "traditional pathway"
- Debunk the myth that one has to be a provost or chief academic officer before becoming a president

Notable Finding #1: Demographics
